Housing	Please consider the situation in Germany for accommodation is always difficult so students must start their research for on and off-campus accommodation early.		

The University notes that it is the student's own responsibility to arrange an accommodation. They strongly recommend that you make arrangements for accommodation in Kleve or Kamp-Lintfort as soon as possible after you have received your Letter of Admission! Also ensure that you are only booking accommodation in Bournemouth for the semester that you will be studying at BU. Health Insurance Exchange students are obliged to arrange for sufficient health insurance coverage during their study period. You can apply for an EHIC/GHIC card which enables you to obtain medical assistance for free when abroad. If you are an EU passport holder you will be able to use your EHIC card when travelling to an EU country. If you are a UK passport holder and/or do not have an EU passport, please read the information about how to apply for a <u>UK GHIC card</u>. As a BU student, you can apply for your EHIC/GHIC card using the BU Letter Request Form. Please note that some non-European partners request that incoming students purchase additional health insurance to comply with their immigration and institutional requirements. You can find further information on the practical arrangements webpage. **Travel Insurance** BU offers a comprehensive BU travel cover to all outgoing students. after reviewing BU's travel cover, and depending on personal considerations or specific health issues, some students might decide to purchase an additional insurance policy to top-up what is available. Please note that BU Travel Cover is updated every August. When travelling to Germany you must consider what document(s) you will **Visas & Permits** need to enter the country and commence your studies or research at Rhine-Waal. This will depend on the country you are travelling from, your home citizenship, the length of your stay in Germany, and the purpose of your stay in Germany amongst other criteria. Please make sure to understand what is needed and secure this in time before you travel and that you have an up-to-date passport that expires no earlier than 6 months after you intend to return. Get in touch with the German Embassy to find out which documents are necessary to study in Germany. Apart from visa regulations every student has to undertake several administrative steps after their arrival in Germany to register with local authorities. In general, you may also be obliged to show proof of sufficient funding to study in Germany and open a special "blocked" bank account with the legally set amount of 8040 € for one year.
