AIMS OF THE DOCUMENT

The aims of this document are to:

- define the structure of the LLM/PG Cert in Intellectual Property programmes;
- specify the programme award titles;
- identify programme and level learning outcomes;
- articulate the regulations governing the awards defined within the document.

AIMS OF THE PROGRAMMES

LLM in Intellectual Property:

The specialist award LLM Intellectual Property focusses on creative outputs, inventive applications of technology, branding opportunities, and the management of the exploitation process. The units will cover all areas of intellectual property law but will also focus on international, comparative and contemporary issues relating to intellectual property. Some of the units are jointly delivered with BU's Postgraduate Certificate in Intellectual Property which has accreditation by IP Reg, the regulatory body for patent and trade mark attorneys. The units are taught by members of the Centre for Intellectual Property Policy and Management (CIPPM) which is a well-established research centre in the Department of Humanities and Law. It has a respected tradition of research in intellectual property law at UK and international levels and was established in 2000. Students are benefitting with the centre's research culture which is enhanced by Annual Symposia and Annual Spring Lectures with high profile speakers. In addition, students can apply for traineeships at the European Patent Office (EPO) and the EU Intellectual property Office (EUIPO) through Bournemouth University's membership of the Pan-European Seal Professional Traineeship Programme.

PG Cert in Intellectual Property:

Bournemouth University became the first university to receive direct accreditation from the Intellectual Property Regulation Board (IPReg), the statutory body regulating the professions of patent attorney (CIPA) and trade mark attorney (CITMA). Students who have completed the following units: **Copyright and Trademarks; Patents and Designs** and either **International Intellectual Property Practice (Patent Attorney Route)** or **International Intellectual Property Practice (Trademark Attorney Route)** will qualify with a PGCert Intellectual Property which provides full exemptions from the foundation level examinations for qualification as a patent attorney or trade mark attorney in the UK (IPReg/CIPA/CITMA).

In summary, both programmes aim to develop graduates who:

- Possess a clear, systematic and critical body of knowledge at the forefront of intellectual property law.
- Have an ability to critically evaluate the latest insights and research in their discipline area, as well as an ability to evaluate and apply established techniques of research and enquiry.
- Can demonstrate a clear ability to engage in self-directed and scholarly research, through which they will use the knowledge and skills they have gained to create their own hypotheses, and data with which to evaluate them.
- Can act autonomously in planning and implementing at a professional level and can communicate their conclusions clearly to specialist and non-specialist audience.
- Utilise a wide range of transferable skills and competencies that will enable them to operate effectively in their future career, their own personal development and lifelong learning.

ALIGNMENT WITH THE UNIVERSITY’S STRATEGIC PLAN

These programmes align with Bournemouth University’s new Strategic Vision (BU 2025) of inspiring learning, advancing knowledge and enriching society. The Faculty of Media and Communication delivery planning supports teaching which benefits from research of international excellence and expertise in professional practice to enable the delivery of research and practice led and informed teaching and prepares students for work in the legal professions or other graduate employment. The programme also aligns well with BU’s strategic investment areas as to they relate to the international legal context of many of these goals, such as medical science and animation. In addition, many units cover elements relating to the UN Development goals such as of Lifelong Learning (UNSG 4), Innovative and Sustainable Industry (UNSG 9), and Sustainable Patterns of Production and Consumption (UNSG 12)—and encouraging students to consider their responsibility as both professionals and citizens for shaping the world they will leave behind.

LEARNING HOURS AND ASSESSMENT

Bournemouth University taught programs are composed of units of study, which are assigned a credit value indicating the amount of learning undertaken. The minimum credit value of a unit is normally 20 credits, above which credit values normally increase at 20-point intervals. 20 credits is the equivalent of 200 study hours required of the student, including lectures, seminars, assessment and independent study. 20 University credits are equivalent to 10 European Credit Transfer System (ECTS) credits.

The assessment workload for a unit should consider the total time devoted to study, including the assessment workload (i.e. formative and summative assessment) and the taught elements and independent study workload (i.e. lectures, seminars, preparatory work, practical activities, reading, critical reflection). Assessment per 20 credit unit should normally consist of 3,000 words or equivalent. Dissertations are part of the LLM in Intellectual Property and are distinct from other assessment types. The word count for a dissertation is 15,000 words recognizing that undertaking an in-depth piece of original research as the capstone to a degree is pedagogically sound.

STAFF DELIVERING THE PROGRAMMES

Students will usually be taught by a combination of academic staff supplemented with colleagues who have relevant expertise including – where appropriate according to the content of the unit – academic staff, qualified professional practitioners, demonstrators/technicians and research students.
