AIMS OF THE PROGRAMME

This programme aims to develop graduates who:

- have the necessary legal knowledge and skills base to complete the academic stage of legal training;
- have the ability to appreciate complex texts and assimilate complex information, deal with multifaceted problems;
- can demonstrate knowledge, understanding and critical awareness of theories, principles and values of law;
- have intellectual independence to undertake self-directed legal research in locating and applying sources of law;
- have highly-developed interpersonal skills and able to communicate both orally and in writing;
- are able to manage their own personal development and lifelong learning;
- demonstrate the law student's skills and qualities of mind in section 2.4 of the QAA Subject Benchmark Statement 2015;
- are able to progress to the external Solicitors Qualifying Examination, Part 1 Assessments where required.

ALIGNMENT WITH THE UNIVERSITY'S STRATEGIC PLAN

This programme aligns with Bournemouth University's new Strategic Vision (BU 2025) of inspiring learning, advancing knowledge and enriching society. It provides our students with an outstanding legal education which is informed by the Department's research and prepares students for work in the legal professions or other graduate employment. It provides students with an opportunity to progress directly to the Solicitors Qualifying Examination, Part 1 assessments.

The Faculty of Media and Communication delivery planning supports teaching which benefits from research of international excellence and expertise in professional practice to enable the delivery of research and practice led and informed teaching.

LEARNING HOURS AND ASSESSMENT

Bournemouth University taught programmes are composed of units of study, which are assigned a credit value indicating the amount of learning undertaken. The minimum credit value of a unit is normally 20 credits, above which credit values normally increase at 20-point intervals. 20 credits is the equivalent of 200 study hours required of the student, including lectures, seminars, assessment and independent study. 20 University credits are equivalent to 10 European Credit Transfer System (ECTS) credits.

The assessment workload for a unit should consider the total time devoted to study, including the assessment workload (i.e. formative and summative assessment) and the taught elements and independent study workload (i.e. lectures, seminars, preparatory work, practical activities, reading, critical reflection.

Assessment per 20 credit unit should normally consist of 3,000 words or equivalent. Dissertations and Level 6 and 7 Final Projects are distinct from other assessment types. The word count for these assignments is 5,000 words per 20 credits, recognising that undertaking an in-depth piece of original research as the capstone to a degree is pedagogically sound.

Students will usually be taught by a combination of senior academic staff with others who have relevant expertise including – where appropriate according to the content of the unit – academic staff, qualified professional practitioners, demonstrators/technicians and research students.

Applicants from Bournemouth University International College programmes which have approved articulation routes must meet the minimum entry requirements in terms of course average and English requirements as stipulated by Bournemouth University.

However, these regulations must be interpreted (and disapplied if necessary) in order to ensure the status of the degree programme as a Qualifying Law Degree. The Solicitors' Regulation Authority and Bar Standards Board have very clear requirements for a Qualifying Law Degree. Relevant provisions which must be taken into account include those relating to the content of the Academic Stage and the Credit Transfer Rules.

WORK BASED LEARNING (WBL) AND PLACEMENT ELEMENTS

Optional placement in the professions, industry, business or in a placement relevant to law, politics, history or media which is broadly defined to include political parties, charities, NGOs, public relations departments, lobbying and campaigning groups, radio stations, local newspapers, internet news providers, and activists' websites. Exemption is possible for those who have comparable work experience. 30 weeks minimum comparable work or study abroad can also meet the placement criteria.
