AIMS OF THE PROGRAMME(S)

The communications industry, in this case journalism, is undergoing huge challenges and changes and the degree continues to reflect and lead in terms of educational and employability skills on a yearly basis, often by the use of minor modifications on specific units where necessary. The MA Multimedia Journalism degree has always been responsive to students' needs, feedback from academic external partners, employers and increasingly digitally focused methods of storytelling.

The existing MA Multimedia Journalism framework and programme is accredited and scrutinised by the nationally recognised Broadcast Journalism Training Council.

The MA Multimedia Journalism makes a unique offering in the UK in its breadth as a conversion degree. Its goal is to address the convergence of print, radio/audio and television/video journalism into a single electronic digital platform and setting this convergence in the context of the globalisation of media organisations and media products. Students are expected to develop a portfolio of work deploying core journalism skills in a variety of media. At the same time, optionality allows students to develop further skills in digital magazine, documentary and investigative Journalism. In addition, the degree has a solid academic underpinning. Journalism in Global Contexts, Legal and Ethical Context, Environment, Conflict and Crisis News, and the Journalism Project all help to develop reflective and critically aware graduates who can function competitively and flexibly in a variety of journalistic environments.

Multimedia journalism is offered as a stand-alone framework. Recruitment is robust, has improved in the last 18 months, with the current cohort numbers above target, and student numbers are likely to continue to grow, especially with the Government's decision to offer UK student loans for postgraduates studies from 2016. To retain MAMMJ's reputation and recruitment, it has continued to innovate, foster industry stakeholders and recruit new members of staff to ensure the programme is pedagogically and technologically sound. Adaptations (minor modifications) have been made to the degree to make it responsive and relevant. Specifically, digital journalism and a multiplatform approach have contributed to a degree which embeds convergence skills while other units also stay theoretically and analytically abreast of changing journalism and communication developments: a coherent degree built on quality journalism underpinned by digital skills and intellectual rigour.

MA Multimedia Journalism aims to develop postgraduates who can deploy online and digital technologies for journalism work in a legal, ethical and critically-informed manner. It aims to develop the research capabilities of students in the field of online and digital journalism, and their understanding of key issues in journalism at a time of technological change.

Our aim is for our curriculum to reflect best pedagogic practice across the board and to become an incubator of innovation that can then be transferred back to external audiences.

LEARNING HOURS AND ASSESSMENT

Bournemouth University taught programmes are composed of units of study, which are assigned a credit value indicating the amount of learning undertaken. The minimum credit value of a unit is normally 20 credits, above which credit values normally increase at 20-point intervals. 20 credits is the equivalent of 200 study hours required of the student, including lectures, seminars, assessment and independent study. 20 University credits are equivalent to 10 European Credit Transfer System (ECTS) credits.

As a general rule, time devoted to assessment should normally represent approximately 25% of the student learning time for a unit (i.e. 50 hours for a 20-credit unit), leaving the rest for specific programme-related activities, including lectures, seminars, preparatory work, practical activities, reading, critical reflection and independent learning.

Of the time devoted to assessment, every 10 hours of student effort is equivalent to approximately 1,000 words of coursework or 1 hour of examination. Therefore, as a guideline, a 20-credit unit would normally require the equivalent of approximately 5,000 words in total (e.g. a 2,000-word written coursework and a 3-hour unseen examination).

STAFF DELIVERING THE PROGRAMME

Students will usually be taught by a combination of senior academic staff with others who have relevant expertise including – where appropriate according to the content of the unit – academic staff, qualified professional practitioners, demonstrators/technicians and research students.

ADMISSION REGULATIONS

The regulations for this programme are the University's Standard Postgraduate Admission Regulations with the following amendments:

For applicants for whom English is not their first language, there is a requirement of IELTS (Academic) 7.0 with at least 6.5 for Writing and 6.0 in the other three components, or direct equivalents. The requirement for TOEFL is an Internet-based score of 105 with 22 in each element, a Computer-based score of 250 with 23 in each element and an essay rating of 4 or a Paper-based total of 600

Applicants should confirm their ability to study at this level by presenting evidence of a UK bachelor's degree, normally with a classification of at least an upper second (2.i), or overseas equivalent in a relevant subject.

Alternatively applicants may demonstrate learning through experience, via portfolios or records of achievement, and/or by tasks set at interview, and confirmed by employer reference/s. A combination of academic and experiential qualifications, to be considered on its individual merits, may also be acceptable.

WORK BASED LEARNING (WBL) AND PLACEMENT ELEMENTS

The Professional Placement (of 3 weeks duration) is a compulsory and integral part of this course, and its successful completion is a requirement for the awards of Postgraduate Diploma and MA. It aims to enable students to consolidate in a journalism workplace the academic understandings and practical journalism skills acquired in all units of the Postgraduate Diploma phase of the programme including an appreciation of the place of theory in the context of practice. It is usually conducted in the Easter break but may be carried out in the 3rd semester summer period to increase flexibility for students in obtaining places and carrying it out, especially overseas. There is a deadline for submission of placement reports.
